Adolescent childbearing among poor urban teenagers. Active heroin and crack cocaine addiction among corrections officers in Washington, D.C.'s prison system. An eight-part series on

six generations of underclass life in one family. Took a short leave in November 1991 and went to South Africa for Simon and Schuster book publishers to work on book about the anti-apartheid movement.

Before leaving *The Post* in August, completed a project on why homicides by adolescent and young male killers in the United States have jumped 145 percent from 1985 to 1996. Two-part series about how young male killers are created published in *The Post* November 29 and 30, 1998.

**February 1984-April 1984:** Covered the U.S. State Department for the Foreign Desk of *The Post*. Wrote about U.S. foreign policy toward Africa, Third World economic development, and covered foreign breaking news stories from the State Department and foreign embassies.

**March 1979-January 1984:** West Africa Bureau Chief for *The Post* based in Abidjan, Ivory Coast. Covered West, Central, and East African countries. Wrote about military coups, results of Sahelian drought, the impact on average citizens of various economic development models, such as communist, socialist and capitalist, and produced numerous feature stories about 33 different African nations. Sent to Beirut, Lebanon and Damascus, Syria from June to September 1982 to cover the Israeli invasion of Lebanon. Highlight of five-year stint -- Returned to the Kilibwoni farming and cattle-raising community in Western Kenya where I had been a Peace Corps volunteer high school teacher from 1969-1970. Wrote a four-part front page series on the economic, social and cultural changes that had occurred there in the intervening 13 years.

**September 1978-February 1979:** An assistant foreign editor on the Foreign Desk of *The Post*. Edited foreign correspondents' stories from 17 *Post* overseas bureaus. Flew to Nigeria November 1978 to cover the diplomatic maneuvering between U.S. and Nigeria on a timetable for Zimbabwe independence.

**March 1978-September 1978:** Covered the vigorously contested three-way electoral campaign for Mayor of Washington while assigned to the City Desk of *The Post*. The race was the second ever mayoral race under limited home rule granted by Congress in 1974. Marion Barry, the underdog who won that contest, later became a well-known, controversial political.

**September 1977-February 1978:** Traveled and wrote in the Caribbean countries of Trinidad & Tobago, Barbados, Guadeloupe, Martinique, and St. Thomas.

**October 1976-August 1977:** Traveled into Angola to live with the guerrillas of the National Movement for the Total Independence of Angola (UNITA), for a second time, at the early stages of that African nation's bitter civil war. The conflict erupted after the Portuguese granted independence in 1975. By prearrangement, rendez-voused with guerrillas on the Zambian-Angolan border then sneaked into Angola with UNITA guerrilla escort. Walked on foot for 2,100 miles through Angola's war zone during 7 1/2 months of reporting. Returned to Washington in July to write seven-part front page series which was published in August.

**September 1974-September 1976:** Worked on The *Post's* City Desk covering Washington's Superior Court and School Board elections. Published two front page series on two aspects of heroin traffic in Washington: The first series was about where the heroin in Washington was grown in Mexico's Sierra Madre, the highlands of Turkey, and the Asian Golden Triangle of Laos, Burma, and Thailand, and how the heroin traveled to Washington along three international trails. The second series covered what happened to the heroin once it arrived in Washington, how it was distributed, where the city's seven open-air markets were located, how addiction was spreading through the city, why heroin overdose deaths appeared in geographic neighborhood clusters, and the impact of a mother's active heroin addiction on her heroin-addicted infant son immediately after his birth.

**April 1974-August 1974:** During an April lecture tour of California state universities and Stanford University about Angola, the Portuguese military's Armed Forces Revolutionary Council overthrew the Salazar-Caetano dictatorship. The Armed Forces Council sent me a telex message at The *Post* saying they had read my Angolan series published in 1973 and inviting me to come to write about the colonial side of Angola. Traveled for three months on the colonial side of Angola and published a front page series in August about Angola's shaky transition to independence and the possibility of a civil war.

**January 1974-March 1974:** Worked general assignment on the City Desk covering daily stories.

**May 1973-December 1974:** At the invitation of the UNITA guerrilla's U.S. representative, who was then a student at Harvard University, I made my first trip into the Portuguese colony of Angola. Met an armed guerrilla escort on the Zambian-Angolan border. Traveled 400 miles over a four-month trek on foot into Angola and wrote about life with the UNITA guerrillas, which was one of three forest-based Angolan guerrilla movements fighting to oust the Portuguese from the country. The other two movements fighting the Portuguese were the Popular Movement for the Liberation of Angola (MPLA) and the National Front for the Liberation of Angola (FNLA).

**June 1972-April 1973:** Covered Montgomery County while assigned to The *Post's* Maryland Desk. Wrote about all aspects of life in one of the richest of Washington's suburbs with special emphasis on the explosive suburban housing growth overwhelming the Metropolitan area's sewage system, thereby, causing extensive pollution of the Potomac River and the Chesapeake Bay.

**February 1971-May 1972:** Worked on The *Post's* City Desk on general assignment reporting daily stories.

**September 1968-January 1971:** Took two-year, five-month leave of absence from The *Post*. Did a semester of teacher training courses at Columbia University in preparation for work as a Peace Corps volunteer rural high school teacher. Taught history and geography in the Nandi District of Western Kenya, East Africa at a community-built, rural Harambee ("Let's Pull Together") high school, 1969-1970.

**June 1966-August 1968:** Worked full-time as a general assignment City Desk reporter at The *Post* while enrolled at Howard University as a full-time student. Graduated from Howard in January 1968.
